1. CALL TO ORDER/ROLL CALL

A quorum was present and Chair Rolando Cabrera, MD, called the meeting to order at 12:00 p.m. at the Downing Resource Center CEO Conference Room 117.

4. BLUE ZONES PROJECT UPDATE

Tiffany DiTullio, CAO Community Wellness, reported Blue Zones Project is a geographically based, community-by-community comprehensive approach to well-being that drives measurable improvement in key metrics. Ms. DiTullio provided the Blue Zones Project Monterey County overview:

- Project overview and partnerships, certification, sustainability and reviewed the contract timeline and cost from August 2018 through July 2024.
- Framework: Population based, certification criteria, community measurement, life radius focus areas, baseline data and transformation.
- Certification: There are three main criteria: baseline data, improvement in metrics measured by Sharecare Community Well-Being Index (CWBI).
- Community Metrics: Smoking, food insecurity, diabetes rates, access to healthy food, high cholesterol, exercise.
- 2023 Well-Being scores as follows: Peninsula cities (30.7%), Salinas (31.7%), South County (15.8%) and Rest of Monterey County (21.8%).
- Progress to certification goals: Including Salinas (100%), Peninsula Cities (5/7 goals met), County-wide (2/6 goals met) and Gonzales/King City (4/8 goals met).
- Sustainability recommendations were reviewed by places (worksites, schools, restaurants), policy focus and community focus.
- Future Vision/Integration is to contract for a 2-year license agreement at the end of September/2025 and to consider moving forward with our own unique brand/program that would reach the entire SVH service area.
- Economics/Timeline: Costs were reviewed for August 2018 through September 2023 and Projected costs.

COMMITTEE MEMBER DISCUSSION: Joel will email his questions and asked how can the Board support south county expansion and development. He stated there has been a lot of great work, including good partners, and asked about goals for the future and sustainability. Dr. Cabrera was concerned that some of the community metrics are in the single digits over a four-year period, the cost of certification and he would like to see details about geography and cultural influences. Ms. Edgcomb commented some of the benefits are not measurable, e.g., continuing exercise MOAIs. Dr. Radner stated the plan is to further study sustainability and bring a proposal forward to the Board.

5. COMMUNITY FUNDING UPDATE

Lynette Fitzgerald, Director Community Benefit, provided an update on FY 24 funding requests, total funds granted, previous support reflecting new requests up to support provided for five years, community benefit focus by coalition building/economic development (29% of total), healthy lifestyles (71% of total), and by service area (majority Monterey County as a whole). Requests are honored once per year. Service Area funding includes SLO & San Benito Counties (2%), Santa Cruz County (2%). The goal is to provide more funding for South County and North County. A full report was provided in the packet.

COMMITTEE MEMBER DISCUSSION: Joel asked if there are any limits on how many times an organization can ask for funding? No, but we ask for one proposal per year which can contain funding for more than one project. Requests must align with the Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA). We also now ask for impact reports to help determine value. Requests are evaluated by a Committee with focus on the CHNA. Dr. Radner stated further discussion on community funding will be included in the September Special Board Meeting workshop on organizational goals.

6. SALINAS VALLEY HEALTH MOBILE CLINIC UPDATE

Lynette Fitzgerald, Director Community Benefit, provided an update on FY24 patient visits (3,902), sports physicals (795), total number of household members fed (16,656), special events (22), 2024 free community flu clinics in October and staffing changes which includes a dedicated FNP and a supervisor.

A full report was provided in the packet.

COMMITTEE MEMBER DISCUSSION: Do we track the type of services provided, immunizations, type of specialty, and by zip code? Yes, the Mobile Clinic uses EPIC and this data is recorded.

7. SALINAS VALLEY HEALTH FOUNDATION REPORT

Melissa Gross, Director Strategic Development, and Jeff Wardwell, Chief Philanthropy Officer, reported on the following:

- Impact: Kim Kelley Award Nursing Scholarship recipients and Salinas Valley Emergency Medical Group Medical Education Scholarship.
- Patient Assistance: Data for FY24Q4 YTD. 635 unique lives, assistance by zip codes, access points (mobile clinic, SVH, palliative care and Cancer Resource Center), gender, age, payor sources.
- Patient Assistance/Pediatric through CMS: Throughout the tri-county area (Monterey, SC, San Benito), 34 unique lives, payor source, referral sources, recipients by county, funds granted, by gender.
- The Foundation is offering Concours d'Elegance Charity Drawing tickets. Over 572 tickets have been sold.

A full report was provided in the packet.

COMMITTEE MEMBER DISCUSSION: It was discovered that some of the requested services from Aspire patients were covered by Aspire insurance; the Foundation worked with Aspire to cover those services. What is the age range? The age has been raised to 19 yo. FY24 funds granted were \$2,857,085M. Ms. Edgcomb noticed the 95076 zip code, do we serve the children in Pajaro; Yes. The Concours d'Elegance charity drawing benefits the Healthy Kids Fund and it also cultivates our donor base.

There being no other business, the meeting adjourned at 1:01 p.m. The date and time of the next Community Advocacy Committee Meeting is scheduled for **November 13, 2024** at 12:00 p.m.

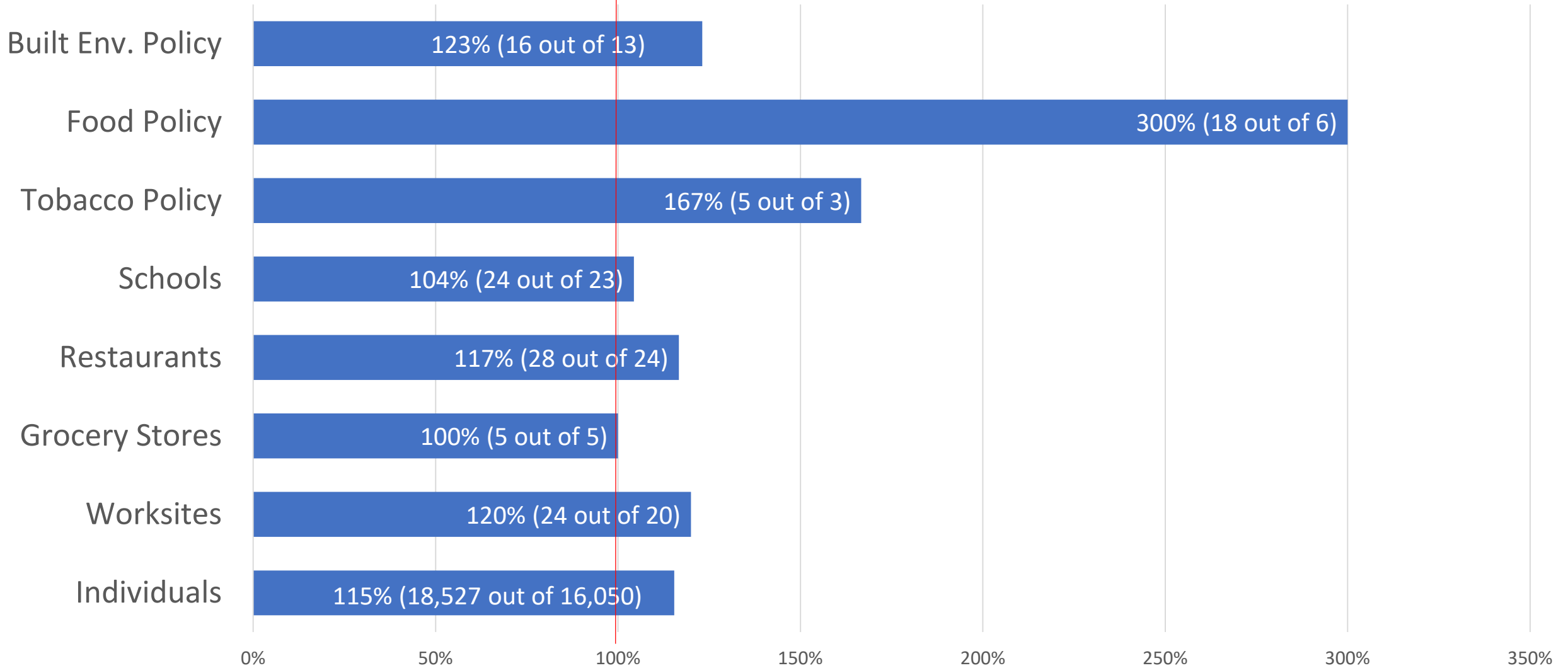

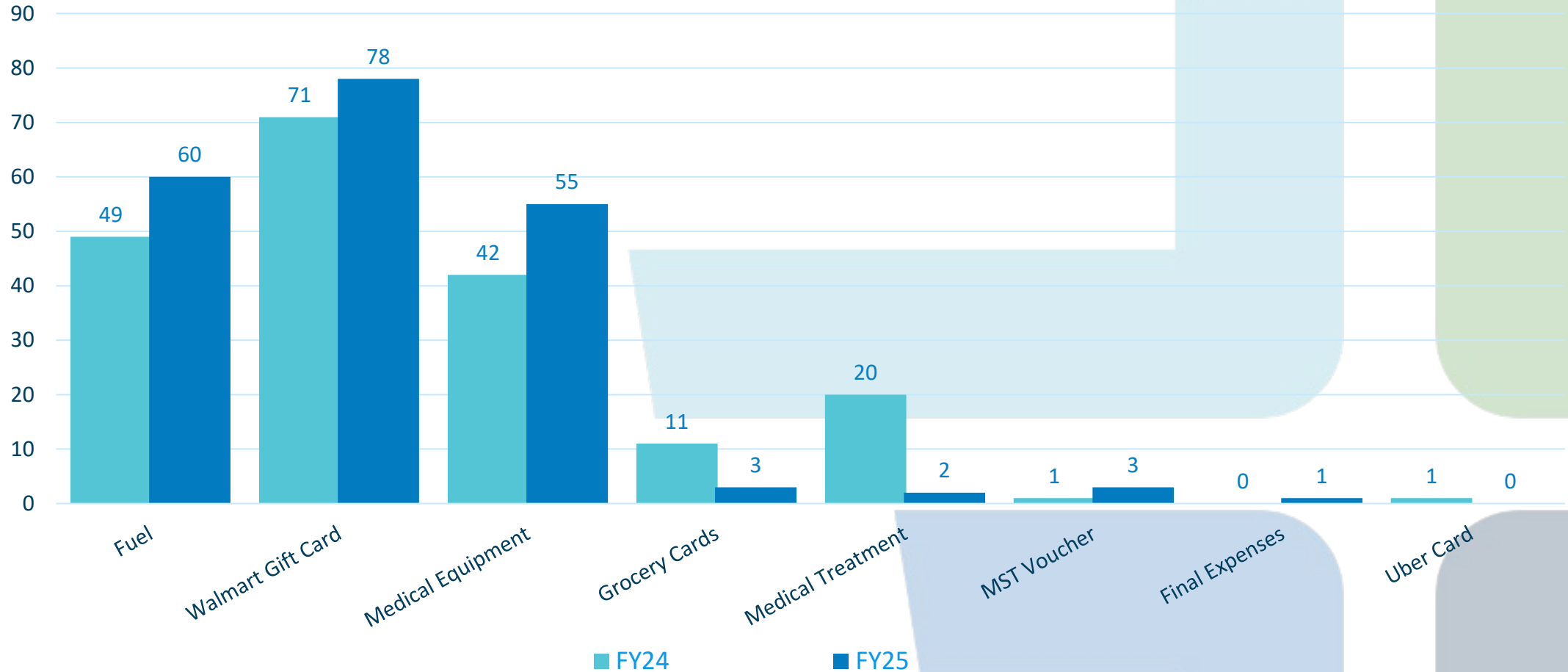

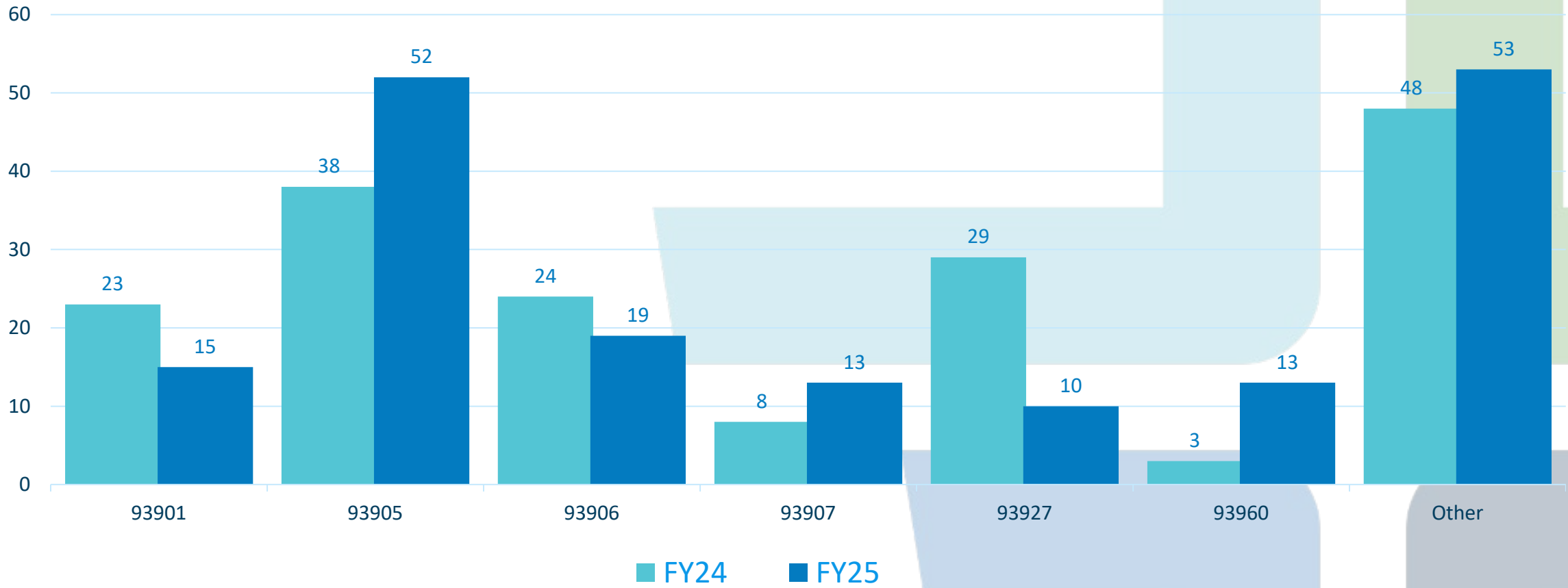

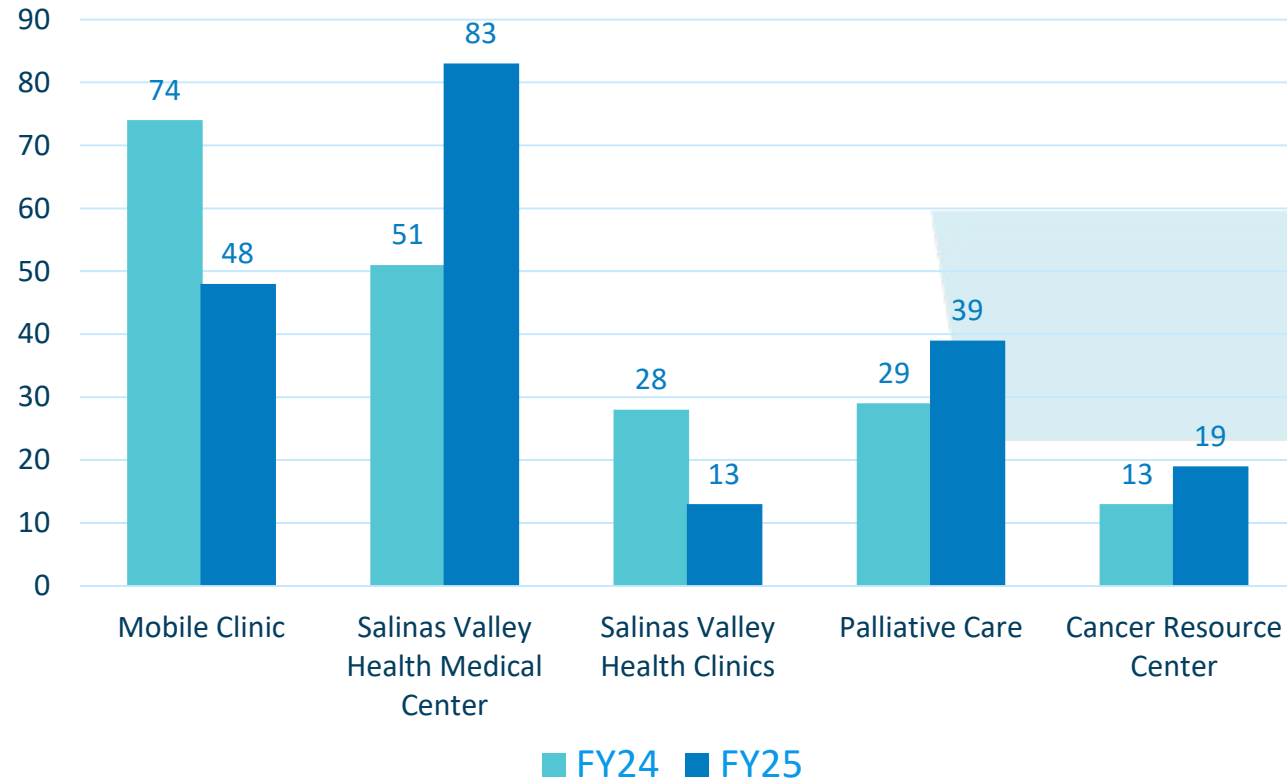

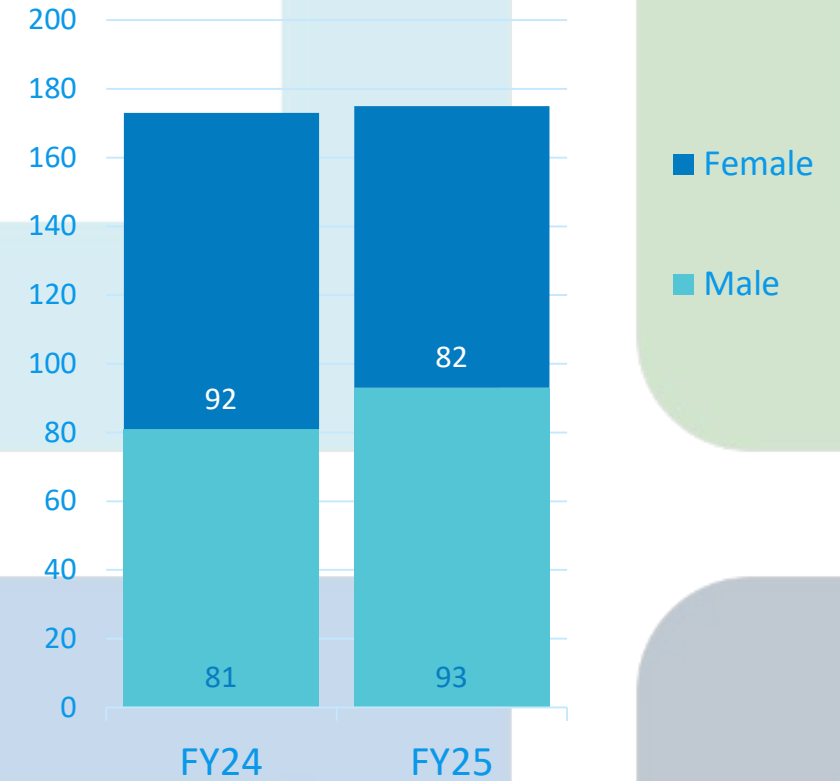

Patient Gender

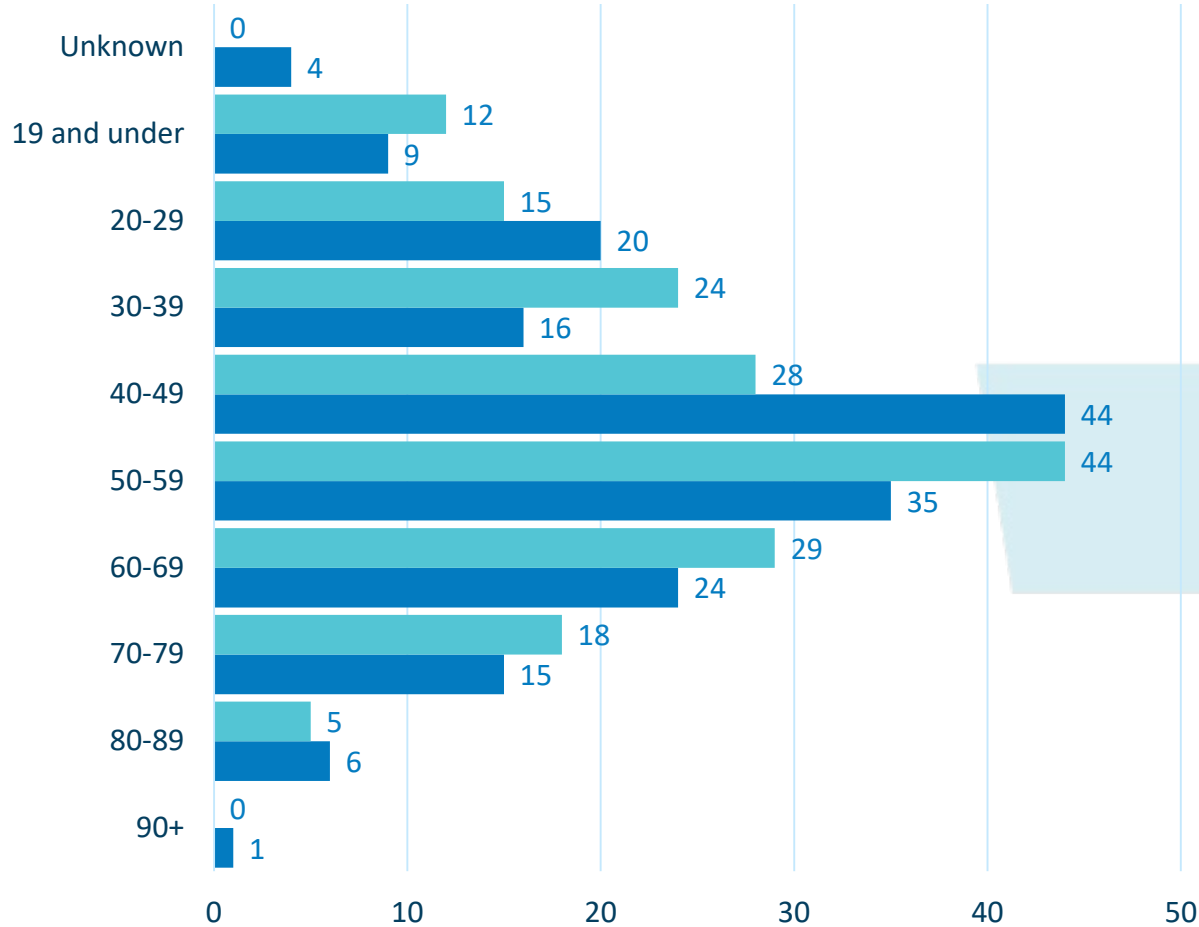

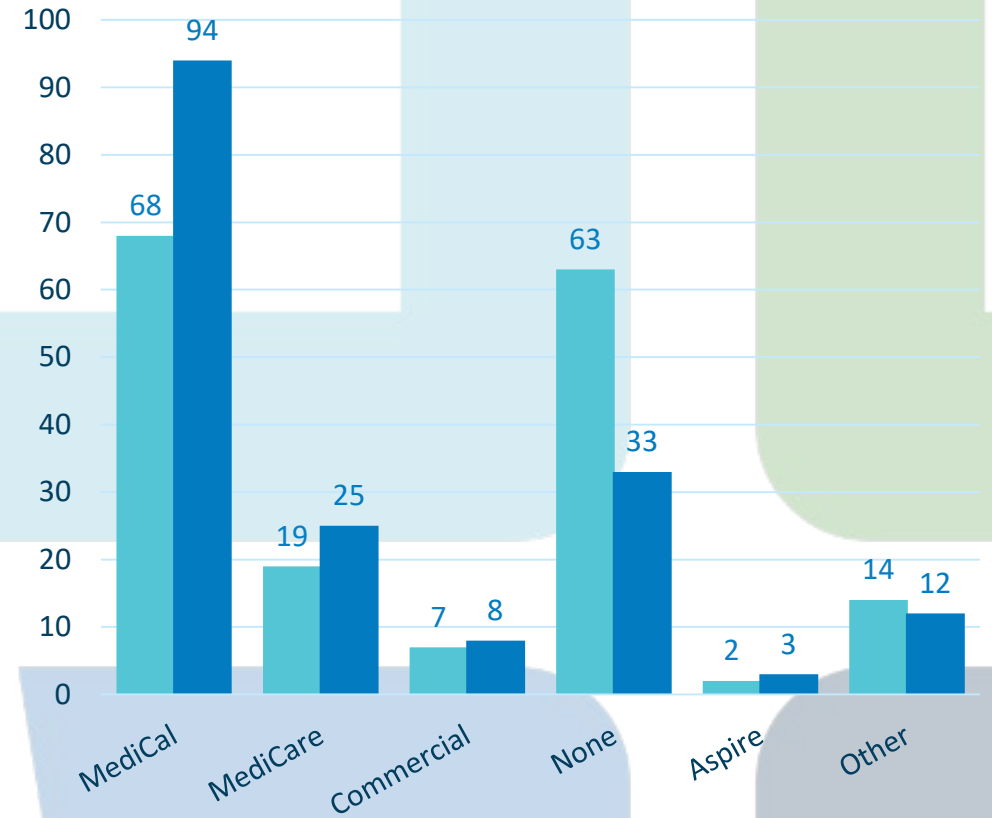

Payor Source

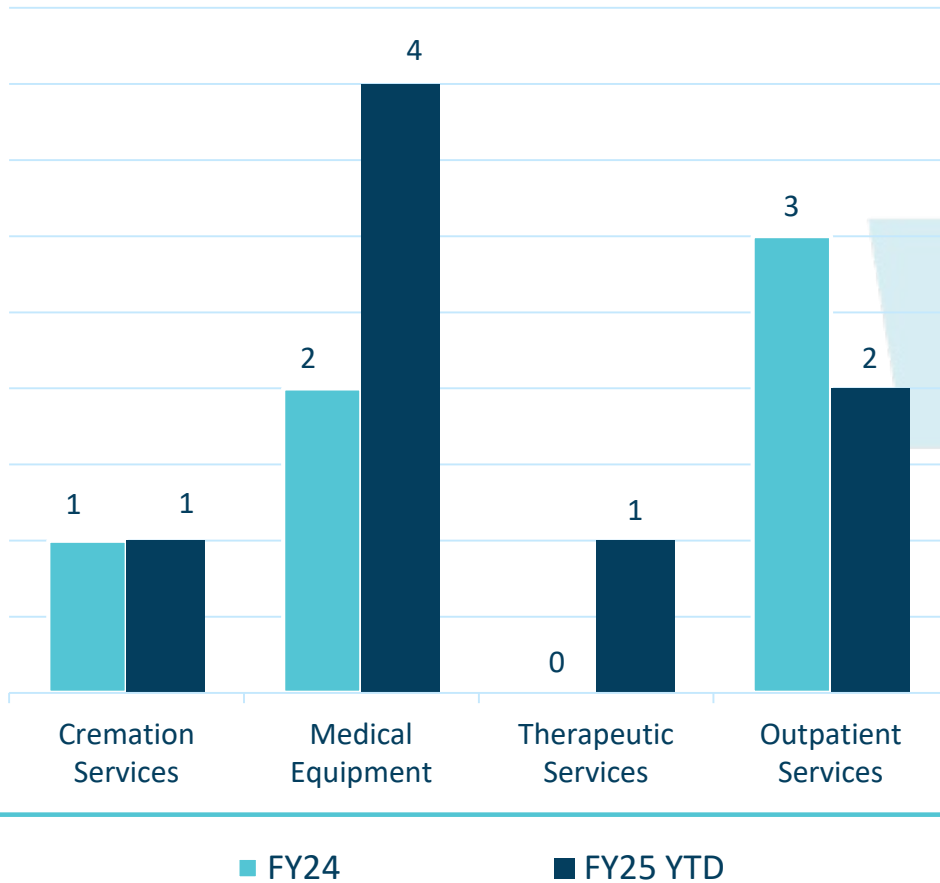

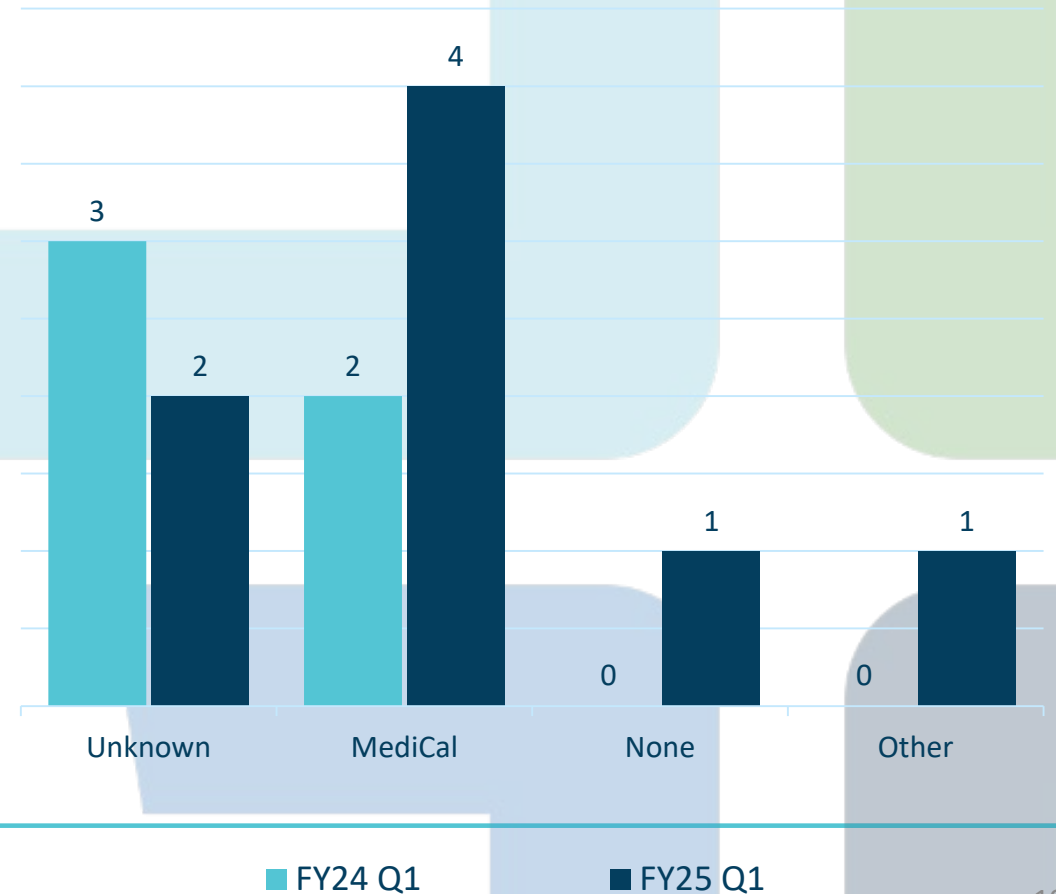

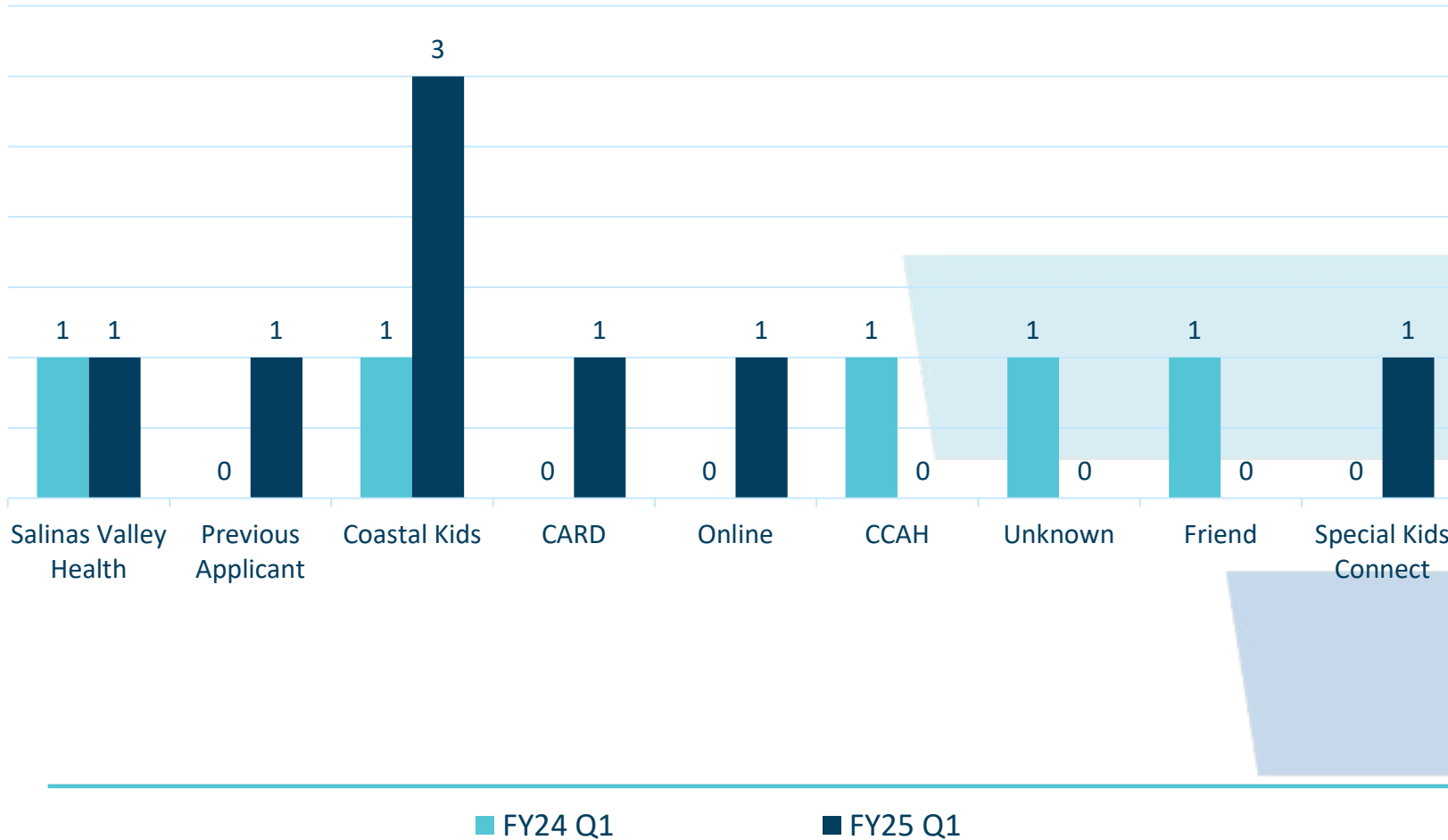

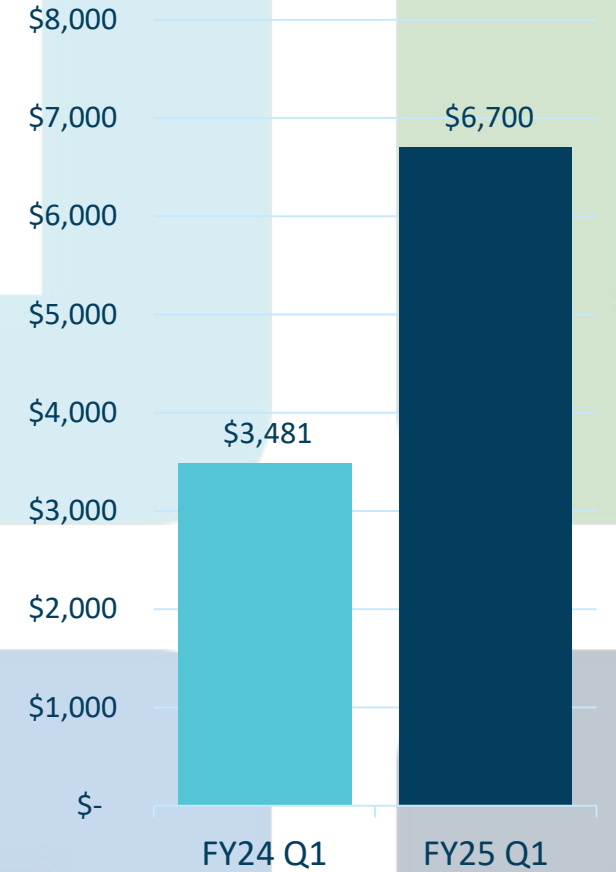

Unique Patients, Referral Source



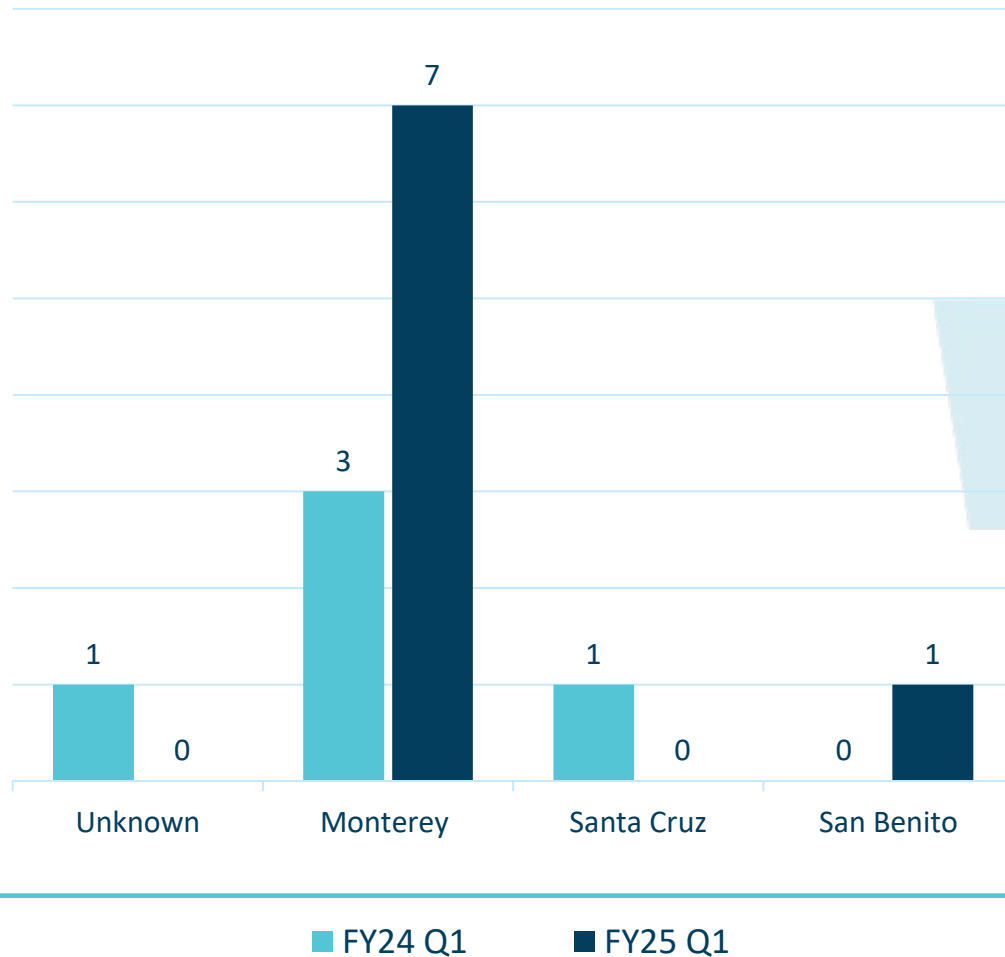
Dollars Spent



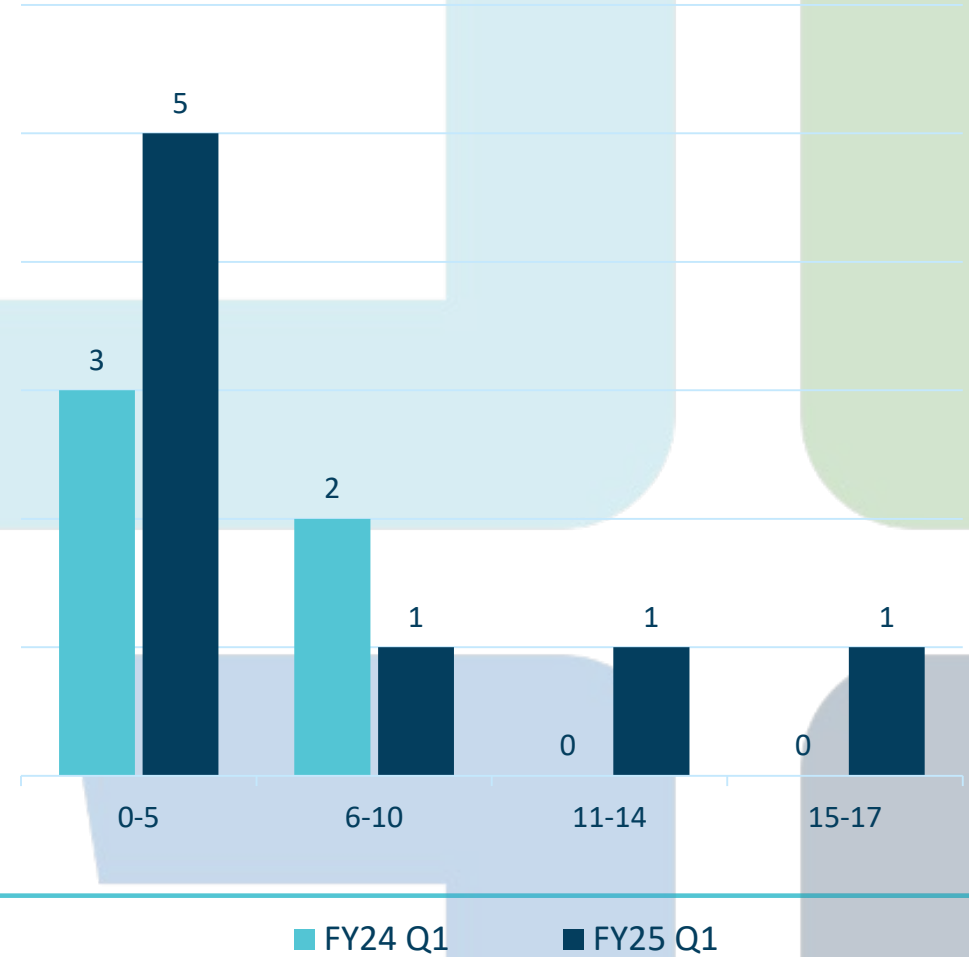

Unique Patients, Recipient County



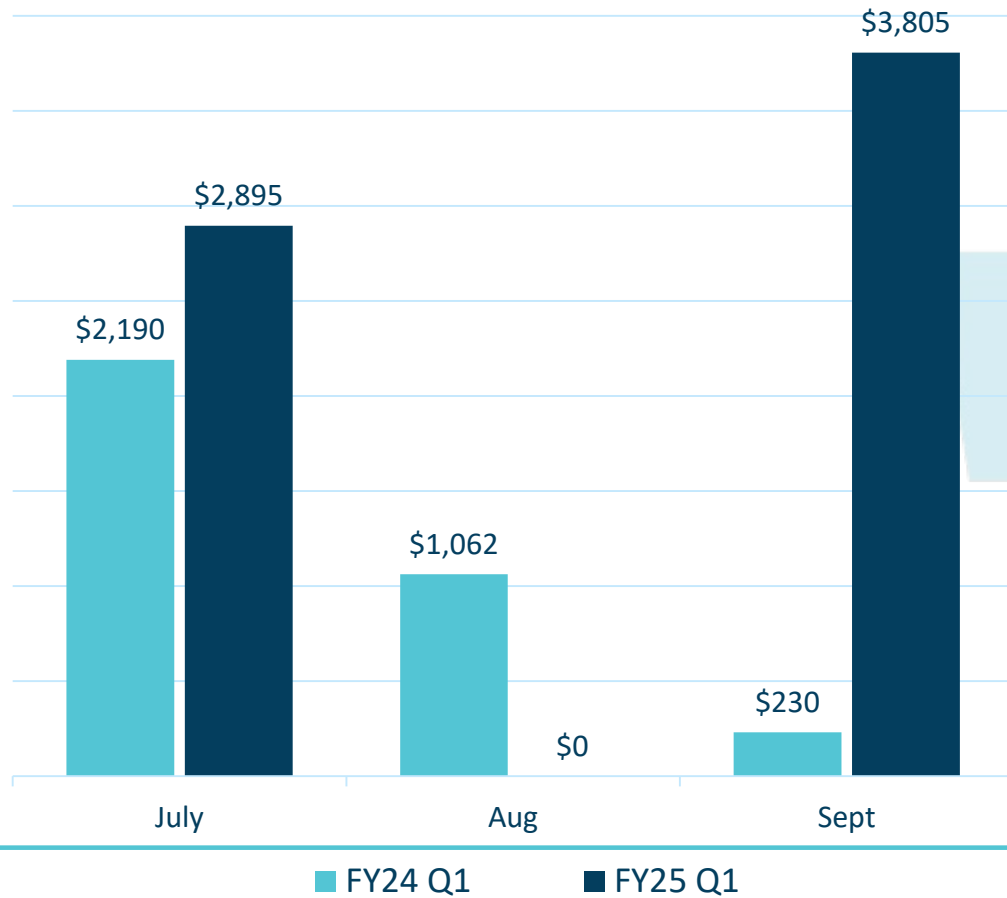
Unique Patients, Recipient Age



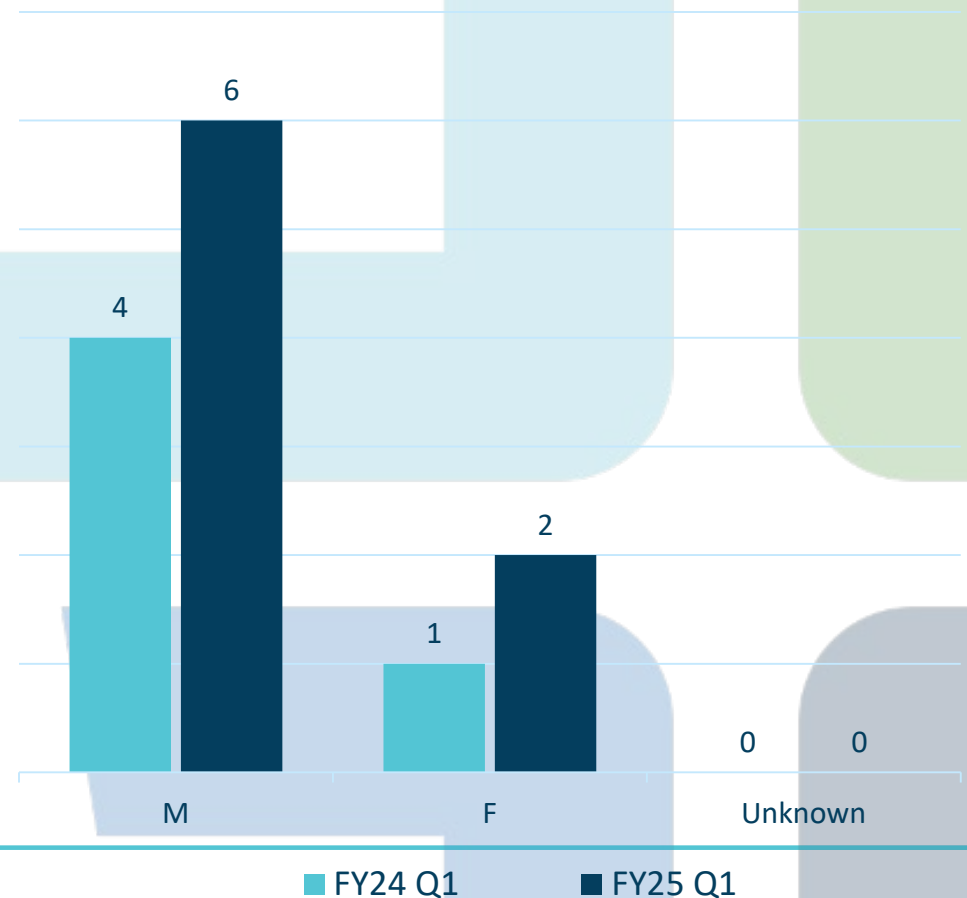

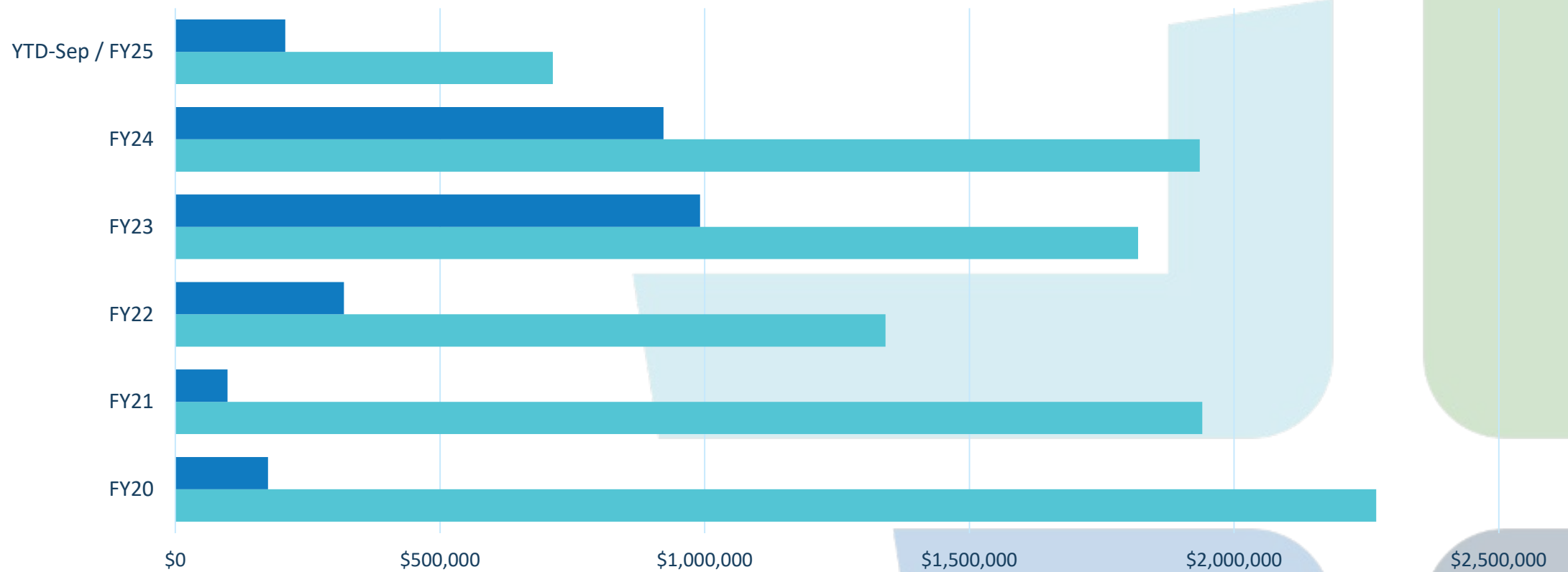
